I have been away from the Parish a good deal this summer - staying for the most part in other peoples' houses. The interesting thing about staying with relatives and friends is to compare their mode of living with our own. We notice the difference in priorities different extravagancies and different economies - various attitudes towards diet, recreation, punctuality in the domestic sphere etc.

The occupants of one charming and well kept house told me that on surveying the roof he found considerable defects - but felt that serious deterioration would not take place during his lifetime, and he was not concerned about what was likely to happen to the house afterwards. This appears to be a reasonable attitude in respect of this and similar circumstandes, but it is not an attitude which the christian can adopt in relation to his Church or Chapel. Christians have to be as much concerned with the future as with the present. The future of our Church rests with the children. Four times a year we have a Childrens' service in the parish Church. The children choose the hymns and choose and read the lessons. It has occurred to me, although I hope I am wrong, that some members of the Church congregation withhold their attendance on the occasion of the Childrens' service. Young people need encouragement and praise. It would please me greatly if all Church members, particularly members of the Parochial Church Council would try and be present at the next Childrens' service which is in December.

The Archbishop of Canterbury has made his call to the nation, and his pastoral letter was read in all Anglican Churches on October 19th.

His call was received with applause from some quarters and criticism from others. "What is the use of a moral revival if advice on this is not coupled with advice on how such a revival would get us

out of our present difficulties" say his critics.

The christian message has always been to the individual - not to the state. The Archbishop addressed his message to each of us, telling us to think about our priorities, and to put God first, our neighbour second and ourselves last. If we all try anddo this our national problems will appear less urgent and less terrible.

We can love our neighbour and do good to those who hate us but the state cannot! make us do this no matter what laws are passed. The state can pass laws to prevent us from hurting our neighbour. When we see the terrible cases of violence and kidnap, the game of cat and mouse played with the lives of innocent victims - it would appear that the state is failing in it's duty.

The word love has been overused and misused these last 30 or more years. Terrible things are done in the name of love. Christian love is not sentiment, it is not passion, it can be severe, and it is

greatly misunderstood.

REMEMBRANCE DAY As we remember the fallen in the world wars - some who gave their lives, others who were conscripted to fight to death - we must also think of the Archbishop's message, because if we allow the slide to chaos to continue, their brave sacrifice will have been entirely in vain.
